MISSING HEIRESS FOUND AFTER 36 YEARS

The case of Marjorie Millington, heiress to the department store Millington & Son who disappeared in 1924, has taken a new turn with the discovery of a skeleton in a cave on the Garenton coast. The bones were discovered in 1939 by a group of guard men, were examined by Dr. Sullivan, an anthropologist at the University. The examination revealed that the bones belonged to a female aged 16-25, approximately with brown hair. The remains were found in the cave for 10-20 years after discovery. Further analysis of the cause of death was strangulation. Only a few teeth remained, which were blue. Additionally, a lapis lazuli earring, four mother of pearl buttons and a silver compact with the initials M.M.M were found with the

It appears that Rufus lied about seeing Marjorie before she went missing. He had a motive to silence her as homosexuality was illegal for men in 1924 and he would risk not only imprisonment but also the loss of his career as a judge and MP. Rufus has an ALIBI he was in court on the afternoon Marjorie vanished.

The discovery of the skeleton reignited interest in the case of Marjorie Millington, who disappeared while shopping for an evening dress. The police had searched for Marjorie tirelessly but her disappearance had remained a mystery.

Many theories had been proposed to explain her disappearance. Some suggested that she had eloped with her suitor, leaving her fiancé Ralph William Fairbourne behind. Others believed that she had been the victim of a botched abortion or that her family had found her and kept her in hiding due to shame.

In 1939, an inmate at the Garenton jail named Terrence Dawkins claimed that he had helped bury a body that matched Marjorie Millington's description. However, investigations found that he did work in the bookshop where Marjorie was last seen, but no body was found in the area where he claimed to have buried it. Dawkins was hung in 1941 for the murder of two young women, but there was no evidence linking him to Marjorie's case.
