The discovery of the sk reignited interest in the case Millington, who disappeared while shopping for an evening dress. The police had searched for Marjorie tirelessly but her disappearance had remained a mystery.

Many theories had been proposed to explain her disappearance. Some suggested that she had eloped with her suitor, leaving her fiancé Ralph William Fairbourne behind. Others believed that she had been the victim of a botched abortion or that her family had found her and kept her in hiding due to shame.

In 1939, an inmate at the Garenton jail named Terrence Dawkins claimed that he had helped bury a body that matched Marjorie Millington's description. However, investigations found that he did work in the bookshop where Marjorie was last seen, but no body was found in the area where he claimed to have buried it. Dawkins was hung in 1941 for the it.
